
& Heston Construction have donated their expertise to help us meet our match for the grant from the Florida Humanities Division of Arts and Culture. The bulk of the match (\$160,000 in cash) has come from 124 donors. **Thank you, Avon Park!!**

We met the grant application deadline and now our application will be evaluated by a grants committee. The fund-raising continues. Our base runner is approaching 2nd base (250K). Our goal of \$500K will ensure that we will be able to install appropriate cabinetry and mount state-of-the-art

Rain: A History for Stormy Times



After serving 40 years as a medical lab technician, Jim came to the museum to volunteer. He said he enjoyed every aspect of those years at the museum. “Giving guided tours for luncheon guests, kids and adults was a big part of it”, he said. At one time he dressed as a Seaboard conductor. He loved taking pictures of the visiting groups and they can be seen on the giant TV that he donated that also shows our old black and white photos. He had a strong interest in



Avon Park’s history and was always eager to learn more.

There were times after giving a tour when he made his way into the Dining Car to don a white chefs’ jacket to serve the dining guests. Following the luncheon, he would be outside arranging a group photo session for a memory photo for the guests.

He thought it would be such a treat for guests to see a close up view of Amtrak’s Silver Star and Silver Meteor passing. He would check the “status” of the train and then he could determine its arrival in Avon Park. He

preferred to have the guests on the ramp for viewing. He found that everyone loves seeing the train. Even the train engineer got in on the act with several blasts of the horn for the enthusiastic and excited crowd waving, as the train passed. Jim added so much to our museum and we are forever grateful. He is truly missed.
